



Curriculum Map- Citizenship

Below is a curriculum map, showing what is taught at each stage of the year.

The GCSE follows the AQA Citizenship specification. Students will gain the ability to form their own hypotheses, create sustained and reasoned arguments and reach substantiated conclusions about citizenship issues. During their period of study students will also understand the range of methods and approaches that can be used by governments, organisations, groups and individuals to address citizenship issues in society, including practical citizenship actions. They will learn skills that allow them to formulate citizenship enquiries, identifying and sequencing research questions to analyse citizenship ideas, issues and debates; by selecting and organising their knowledge and understanding in responses and analysis. when creating and communicating their own arguments.

Through extended writing and examination, students will be explaining hypotheses, ideas and different viewpoints and perspectives, countering viewpoints they do not support, giving reasons and justifying conclusions drawn. It is important in Citizenship that students present their own and other viewpoints and represent the views of others, in relation to citizenship issues, causes, situations and concepts, and plan practical actions aimed at the benefit of others in society. Crucially students of Citizenship will show knowledge and understanding of the relationships between the different citizenship aspects studied, using the concepts to make

connections, identify and compare similarities and differences in a range of situations from local to global.
